

Many employers still recruit through their own company website.

Recruitment Agencies

Can help you to get full time, part time or temporary work;



- Explore their careers pages.
- Follow them on social media to check for vacancies.

*Remember, <u>local councils</u> are also employers Are useful for connecting you with jobs not advertised online or in the press.

Search for recruitment agencies in your local area on websites like <u>Agency Central</u>.

Networking sites

- Search for advertised job vacancies on networking sites like <u>LinkedIn</u>.
- You can apply through your LinkedIn profile or upload your CV.
- Keep your profile updated and make it as appealing as possible to recruiters.





Speak to employers directly

- Contact them by email, phone or visit in person make an appointment before you visit.
- Ask about potential job opportunities and training schemes.
- Be ready to hand in your CV.



Hidden job market

• Includes the jobs that are not advertised.



• You can also use social media to find hidden work, e.g. a contact might direct you to a job that's not advertised.

Job fairs - events where recruiters come to meet potential employees
